The Kitty Horton Car Collection Tour—By, Denny Oestreich

Once in a while time gets away from me and this story is late, but I still think it is worth telling.

Dave Peedin arranged for the Piedmont Classic Chevy Club to tour Ms. Kitty Horton's farm near Hurdle Mills, NC on October 29, 2017. This was our opportunity to see her many collections including cars, tractors, antiques and other collectables Dave arranged for us to meet at Sir Walter Chevrolet on Highway 70 in West Raleigh and cruise to the Horton Homestead.

Our caravan of 20 vehicles with 46 people travelled thru Durham and then north toward Hurdle Mills. Dave led the caravan traveling at a reasonable speed, but as with all processions, the cars in back had to sometimes pedal hard to keep the cars in front in sight. I was in the back and with a few stop lights in Durham we seemed to be lost, but all worked out and we caught up somewhere north of Durham. The trip was about 43 miles.



As with all PCCC events, this one included **good food**. We stopped at the Homestead Steakhouse and Restaurant in Timberlake, NC to enjoy a buffet lunch. The lunch was great and we even had time to sample all the desserts. Ms. Horton was able to meet us for lunch.






The Horton Home Place was few more miles down the road and around a couple corners. Ms Horton lives in her grandfather's farm home which she has updated and maintains, including mowing of many acres. There are several farm buildings ranging from older tobacco barns to modern garages which house her collections. Around the edges of the fields and tree lines are collections of old farm implements such as plows, hay rakes and cultivators.

The Kitty Horton Car Collection Tour—By, Denny Oestreich


Kitty has many collection interests. The first garage she showed us contained several Mustangs, old and new, and other collector cars. She even had the first Mustang that her father bought new for her when she was in high school. Her collector vehicles are kept in driving condition. With five buildings there were many interesting vehicles to see. There were several trucks including a restored F-100 pickup, two 1953 Fords and a fire truck. She had about 25 collector vehicles total. One building contained four wheelers, golf carts and a newer Jeep. She had several tractors including Farmall, Oliver, and John Deere.





Another building contained antiques such as frying pans, traps, kerosene lamps, sewing machines and signs. Among her large collections were hatchets and hand saws. Some of the saws were arranged into art displays. This was a "pickers paradise" although she seldom sells from her collections.

Most interesting to me was the collection of 20-30 nonrunning vehicles in a field in back of the buildings. This collection of vehicles included old farm trunks, several 1950s





Ford pickups, and other big trunks. There were even a few Chevrolets in her collection. These vehicles could be waiting for restoration or to donate parts. There was even a small helicopter which had been used as a holiday display.

Kitty Horton enjoys her collections and allowed us to look around. We had an interesting visit with Kitty and we thanked her for hosting us with a commemorative plaque. Thanks to Dave Peedin for planning and leading this great tour.

Dave Smith's Technical Corner

It is generally recommended that if you have only ONE car, and you depend on it to get to work and so forth, that you drive a car less than twenty years old, and not over ten to fifteen years old unless you know the car has been well maintained and doesn't have a zillion miles on it.

Now if you really like old cars, and shop carefully, and pick one that's in good condition and has been well maintained, you can expect it to be REASONABLY reliable, if you are willing to spend some money on it on a regular basis.

The cost of maintaining a classic car, or vintage car, if you select one that was built in large numbers, such as an Impala or Ford Galaxie or one of the big Plymouths or Chryslers, is generally going to be considerably less than the amount that DEPRECIATION will cost you if you buy a nice new car.

Consider the case of let us say a 63 Chevrolet Impala. I used to own one. If it is IN good condition when you get it, and you expect to put some miles on it, say ten thousand a year, then you can expect to be spending maybe a thousand a year on things like a new more or less COMPLETE brake job, a couple of hundred a year on tuning up the engine, three oil changes, a battery every third or fourth year, tires about as usual, a water pump, a starter motor, an alternator, etc., from time to time.

And this car will burn a lot more gasoline than a comparably roomy new car.

If you wreck it, it's going to take a while to put your hands on USED original equipment bumpers, fenders, and doors and so forth. But there are plenty of after market parts available, anything you want, for THIS particular car, lol, from headlight to tail light, and they don't cost anymore and usually cost a lot LESS than the corresponding body parts for a NEW car, which are often only available at a dealer, for the first few years.

So....... Maybe it will cost you up to three thousand a year on average to keep a classic car on the road, if you buy one that's been well maintained, and maintain it well, if you drive it regularly. If you're lucky, and do a lot of the work yourself, it might not cost more than a few hundred bucks some years, especially if you don't drive it very much.

You will generally spend that much on DEPRECIATION and routine maintenance on a nice new car, plus you will likely have to pay more in taxes and insurance. And while your new car is depreciating away, your vintage or classic car may well be APPRECIATING significantly. I sold my old Impala for maybe three hundred bucks (in 1975) when it got to the point it was ragged out and in need of a lot of work.

But the body was still nice and straight and still pretty much rust free, and if I had just rolled it into a barn, I could get eight thousand for it in a flash, NOW, even needing just everything from tires to new brakes and shocks to an engine rebuild to new seat covers.



Dave Smith's Technical Corner

I know a number of people who have spent considerably less maintaining their classic car than they have gained in appreciation on it over a period of five or ten years.

Your mileage may vary.

Two things are absolute musts if you want to buy and drive a vintage car. ONE make sure it's not a rust bucket. Two, find an OLD mechanic and take him with you and pay him to spend at least an hour, preferably two hours, going over the car, and then tell you PRIVATELY what he thinks of it.

Some other very important things, if you want to actually DRIVE the car on a regular basis, is that you select one that has plenty of aftermarket parts available. DO NOT expect to drive a rare car, or a vintage sports car such as a Jag or MG or BMW on a regular basis unless you are prepared to spend a LOT of money on it.

American pony cars and muscle cars are easy to work on, and after market parts are actually quite cheap, compared to parts for NEW cars, and while SOME of them have been ABUSED, most of them have NEVER BEEN raced or abused in any manner, except once they got old, the owners quit spending anything on them to keep them in good condition.

Driving like a maniac or race car driver on public roads more than once in a long while is a sure way to lose your license and maybe your car as well, and to cause your insurance company to triple or quadruple your rate, and so MOST people who buy high performance cars NEVER drive them very hard at all. Maybe once in a long while they floor it for a few seconds, that's about it. That doesn't do a car any harm.

So if you want a Mustang or Camaro or Charger, etc., you can find an older one that has NOT been wrecked or raced or owned by a family with a teen age kid, if you look around and shop carefully.

Keep in mind that some makes never sell enough cars to make it worthwhile for after market companies to make lots of parts for them. If you buy a BMW or Mercedes or MG or Jag, etc., expect to pay a LOT for any parts you will need, and you WILL need parts. Also, it's prudent to stick near home if you're driving an OLD car. You won't likely find anybody who can fix it in a hurry if you take it on a long trip and you have a problem. If you drive a classic, drive your daily car for long trips.

And DO NOT FORGET that OLD cars are not as safe as new ones.

So consider the cost of upgrades also.

Again keep the shiny side up and the greasy side down, until next time Dave has left the computer.

The 1966 Chevrolet Biscayne, Bel Air, Caprice and Impala

The 1966 Chevrolet Biscayne, Bel Air, Impala, and Caprice were marked by blockier body lines as well as new fenders, bumpers, grille and rectangular wraparound taillights.

A 427-cubic-inch V-8 debuted -- an enlargement of the 396-cubic-inch Mark IV engine -- developing 390 or 425 horsepower. Also available was a 396-cubic-inch V-8 rated at 325 horses, and a 327. Hardtop models got new perimeter



frames and body mounts as Chevrolet promised a "Jet-smoother ride." Each series -- Biscayne, Bel Air, Impala, and Caprice -- included a station wagon. Three-speed column gearshifts were fully synchronized in all forward gears.

The Super Sports had new slim-profile Strato-bucket seats. Impala remained the family favorite, but the posher Caprice became a separate series as a result of the nameplate's 1965 success -- when marketed as an option. Aiming at Ford's upscale LTD and billed as the "most luxurious Chevrolet yet," the four-model Caprice series was strictly V-8-powered.



Caprices could have optional reclining Strato-back front seating. The Caprice Custom Coupe got a more formal, "one-of-a-kind" roofline with decorative exhaust ports under the rear window. Like its four-door counterpart, the coupe featured wide rocker sill moldings, dual color-keyed striping, and fleur de lis emblems on roof guarters.
