



Growing up, my dad always had some sort of shop space. When I was a kid, it was a 2.5 sided pole barn with a floor lift we added when I was a teenager. The space was huge, probably 100"x50". The walls were lined with racks for storing parts, racing slicks, transmissions and tool boxes and work benches.

More than half of my childhood memories originated in the pole barn shop. It is here that my Uncle found me breaking down the carburetor on my first car when dad had instructed me to break down the engine. When he asked what I was doing, I realized my mistake and put it back together by memory. As far as I know it still operated 10 years later.

I learned how to weld in the shop and built mud houses with my little sister. I learned how to identify the size of a bolt or a bit by eye or hand the correct tool on request. I learned to change the oil and rotate tires. We built a table by putting a piece of plywood across some sawhorses and I practiced chicken showmanship. Bottom line, the shop was our hangout.

Sam's choice diet soda cans littered every imaginable surface. Dad worked swing shift at a grocery store and we squeezed shop time into the morning and his days off he wasn't big on putting away tools, I think he never felt he had the time. A few times a year my sister and I would collect all the soda cans into trash bags and we'd haul them down to the recycling center for some spending cash.

When I went away to college Dad had saved enough to build a large, fullyenclosed shop. This one was a 40"x60" metal building. My (then fiancé) husband Chas was recruited to help with the concrete floor pour. We consider it was his dowry. Dad finally had a space he could heat in the winter and keep cars and tools out of the weather.

All my life I felt like some day I'd have a shop too. In high school I wrote an essay about my dream shop. It would have 6 stalls and I also detailed which car would be housed in each stall.

Classic Car Trivia—History of Custom Wheels

The world of custom wheels began with racing. During a time when cars were getting more and more power, they needed to have more traction. To achieve this, they had to get wider tires. In order to get wider tires, you needed wider wheels.

As early hot rodders and racers looked for ways to squeeze more performance out of their vehicles, their attention turned to wheels and suspensions. Early steel wheels were usually designed with two pieces of pressed steel welded or riveted into a single unit. Lighter-weight wheels would reduce unsprung weight, improving braking, handling and steering response, and they could offer ventilation for overheated brakes as well.

By the early 50's, various lightweight cast-alloy or magnesium wheels were making their way to the race market, marrying function with a good-looking and unique style. Hot rods and customs were also coming into their own in the 50's, but usually hot rodders had to settle for steel wheels with aftermarket hubcaps or trim rings.

By the early 60's, tastes and technology had evolved...50's-style hot rods were on their way out, and sleek, shiny late-model cars were becoming popular. In '64, Cragar broke the market wide open with the S/S wheel, a chromed design with five cast aluminum spokes riveted to a steel rim. Before long, Cragar had competition in the custom wheel business, from brands like Astro, American Racing, E-T, Keystone, and Rader. New designs like slotted wheels, chrome-reverse and others were making their way to the market.

Cragar Corporation was founded by Crane Gartz. The Cragar name combines the first three letters in his first and last name, and originally sold aircraft engines and cylinder heads for the Model A Ford.



Cragar wheels made its mark in drag racing associations such as the National Hot Rodding Association, The International Hot Rodding Association, and the American Hot Rodding Association.

By the 70's, the trend was toward custom wheels, wider tires in the rear and a jacked-up stance with the rear end raised. The mid to late 70's, though, saw the rise of custom pickup trucks and vans, and suddenly a whole new category of custom wheels emerged, often stamped-steel wheels that offered toughness and durability along with good looks and light weight.

Keystone's history begins with a father and son who opened their first store together. Joe Amato Sr., a native of northeastern Pennsylvania, opened the first Keystone Store, called A&A (Amato and Amato) in the early 1960s. Several years later, Joe's son Joe Jr. became a partner in the family business. Joe Jr. was passionate about drag racing but he was also devoted to building his family legacy. Following his passion for racing, he created S&S Speed, which was devoted exclusively to speed and performance parts.





American Racing Wheels was founded in San Francisco in 1956 and was immediately linked to the American Muscle Car movement. The 5 spoke Torq Thrust Wheel was originally designed in 1963 by American Racing Wheels. It has been named one of the "20 Speed Parts that Changed the World" by Hot Rod Magazine. Its popularity and proven efficiency has helped it to with stand the test of time and is still one of the most popular wheels.
