



"Fifty years from now, when you're looking back at your life, don't you want to be able to say you had the guts to get in the car?" Sam Whitwicky-Transformers 2007.

I have been a lifelong fan of the Transformers. Ever since they "rolled out" across the TV screen, I was hooked. The toys were awesome, the story lines were (in my mind) amazing, and the characters like Optimus Prime and Bumblebee were cemented into my personal being because they weren't just heroes, they were characters that had a good message that surrounded them. It's a love that has stuck with me to this day. In fact, I still collect the toys and I am the lucky owner of 2 Bumblebee replica cars: the first from the movie *Dark of the Moon*; the second (my childhood favorite) a G1 1970 VW Bug.





The story I want to share starts back in June. I found out that a car show in Fayetteville, NC was going to have the only fan made replica of the Age of Extinction Optimus Prime on display. Being the fan that I am, my fiancé and I loaded our 8 and 10 year old kids into my 2012 Bee and we drove down to see him. My hopes were that I might get lucky enough to get a picture with the truck and maybe... just maybe I could sneak Bee in and get a picture of the two of them together. All of the above happened and I was actually able to get some pictures of Bee and Prime together - it was a total dream come true. I met Joe, the owner, and his family and several members of what they call "Team Prime." We exchanged contact info and an email or two after the event, all very cordial. Joe inquired if I might be interested in doing an event with him at some point, but no promise of anything solid.

Fast forward to October 27th, 2021. I was at school working when I received an email from Joe asking if Bee and I would be up for joining him in York, South Carolina for some Anti-Bullying Events (the core of what Joe does with Optimus), a Christmas Parade, and a Toy Drive. It was that moment when the quote at the beginning popped into my head and without really thinking, I said YES. I figured, if I died tomorrow I would want to go knowing I was able to fulfill my childhood fantasy of "Rolling Out" with Optimus Prime. (I'm not going to lie...saying that still makes me giddy.)



So plans were set and I made the trek south after a month straight of working on mods to Bee to make him a bit more screen accurate and to make him talk. Yes I said it: he talks. Not conversationally, but he can talk through his radio just like he does in the movies but controlled by me.

We met at the York City Fire Station where Optimus Prime was hiding out. I got a tour of the station and then when Joe arrived, the show was on - off to the first school, Hunter Road Elementary School. Sgt. King of the York Police Dept. was in the lead, followed by a fire truck, then Bee, then Prime and then another police vehicle. We rolled up to screaming kids, freaking out because Prime and Bee just showed up at their school on a chilly Wednesday out of the blue. Joe climbed out of Prime and went right into presentation mode. It's hard for me to describe how well he did this. His Anti-Bullying message is extremely well thought out, heartfelt, and powerful. It comes from a place of respect, understanding, and identification. Joe, much like many of us, was bullied as a kid. When it started happening to his own son, he decided to show him by example that it doesn't matter what people say, you can do anything if you try and if you persevere. That is how Prime came to be. The presentation lasted about 45 minutes and then he brought out a huge costumed Bumblebee and Prime for the students to take photos with. With the first one done, I got it. I understood what we were doing, what my place was, and why I was there.

Afterwards, we went back to the fire station to stage the second stop for the day.

Around 11am, we headed out to Harold C

Johnson Elementary School. Again, another great school, another wonderful group of students/teachers, and another fantastic delivery of a really amazing message.





Afterwards, the real adventure began. We had the afternoon off, so Joe tossed out the idea of just driving around and taking pictures of the cars around town and in front of some cool old buildings. So, I literally got to spend the next 4 hours just following Optimus Prime through the back roads of York, SC in Bumblebee...it was my childhood fantasy coming to life. We would stop at places, traffic would stop, and people would jump out of their cars in the middle of the road to take pictures. It was mind blowing. My mind is still just a little blown still thinking about it.

The rest of the trip was a series of equally phenomenal events and experiences. Thursday we had a stop at York Preparatory Academy where we were joined by Captain America (#ColoradoCaptain), Joe's family, and the rest of "Team Prime." From there we did a *Hero's of Hope* stop to visit Tristan, a four year old boy with Stage 4 Cancer and his family. Friday I was joined by my fiancé Julie (aka the most amazing woman on earth for letting me run off and do all of this) and our two youngest daughters Ivy and Virginia for the "York Greatest Show" Christmas Parade featuring Optimus Prime, Bumblebee, Captain America, Ecto1, some very cool classic cars, tractors, fire engines, and loads of other great entertainment. If all of that awesomeness wasn't enough, we finished the week out Saturday by taking part in a toy drive to benefit PATH (People Attempting To Help) and the York Community.

I can honestly say that the experience as a whole was life changing and left me with the greatest sense of pride and accomplishment. Bee and the Transformers mean a lot to me and always have, but to see how much this whole trip meant to others was really touching and to see how much good one small group of Transformers fans can do in such a short time, has forever left me...well... *Transformed!*

Classic Car Trivia—The Wagons

A **station wagon** is an automotive body-style variant of a sedan/saloon with its roof extended rearward over a shared passenger/cargo volume with access at the back via a third or fifth door (the liftgate or tailgate), instead of a trunk/boot lid. The body style transforms a standard three-box design into a two-box design — to include an A, B, and C-pillar, as well as a D-pillar. Station wagons can flexibly reconfigure their interior volume via fold-down rear seats to prioritize either passenger or cargo volume.





The first station wagons were built in around 1910, by independent manufacturers producing wooden custom bodies for the Ford Model T chassis. Station wagons were first known as a "Depot Hacks" because they were used to carry passengers and cargo after they got off of trains. The early design was based on a truck platform that did not contain doors. In 1923, Star, a division of Durant Motors, became the first car company to offer a station wagon assembled on its production line using a wooden wagon body shipped in from an outside supplier.

The first all-steel station wagon body was the 1935 Chevrolet Suburban. As part of the overall trend in the automotive industry, wooden bodies were superseded by all-steel bodies due to their strength, cost, and durability. By 1951, most station wagons were being produced with all-steel bodies.



Station wagons were initially considered commercial vehicles rather than consumer automobiles and the framing of the early station wagons was left unsheathed, due to the commercial nature of the vehicles. The commercial vehicle status was also reflected on those vehicles' registrations.







The modern design of a station wagon reached its peak in the 1960s. This decade saw the development of compact, mid-size and full-size wagons. After the gasoline crisis of the 1970s, the station wagon began to lose popularity. The minivan design was becoming more practical and muscle cars took center stage. As the 1980s approached, front-wheel drive cars became popular, and Sport Utility Vehicles became more popular. At this point in America, station wagon production was nearly obsolete.
