As many of you now know, our original reservations at Chestnut Tree Inn were cancelled without notice. The hotel was sold and the employees were given ONE DAY's notice. I have been on the phone and computer all morning checking out other options. Because the rates go up in the fall due to tourists booking rooms to enjoy the leaf changing season in the mountains, there are really no GREAT DEALS and not many good options. Great Smokies Inn has the best price and the ratings aren't bad. This hotel is only a quarter mile from the entrance to Cruising the Smokies event this year.



Travel on Thursday Oct 13. Check out & return home on Oct 16

I have already put a hold on 16 rooms here mostly because of convenience and price. If you choose to stay here, you must call 828-497-2020 – ask for Christy – and tell her you are with the Piedmont Classic Chevy Group. Christy explained that 3 Hotels have been recently bought out and phones have been ringing off the hook with travelers trying to find new accommodations. This is unfortunate but leaves us few choices.

SPECIAL REQUEST !!!!

Don't forget to call and pay for your room. If you don't call by October 1st, your room will be dropped from the group and will be made available to someone else. Our group rate of \$89.00 is based on a minimum of 10 rooms. I have blocked 16. They all have 2 Queen beds

Downside:

- #1 They do not offer a breakfast option but are walking distance to several restaurants.
- #2 It is an older motel but appears to be nice.
- #3 some reviews aren't great but most are good.
- # 4 all available rooms are on second floor (one short flight of stairs 4 other car groups have already booked all rooms on ground level and have been staying there twice per year for several years. That says a lot for return customers.

Upside:

- #1 Convenient to everything especially the event.
- # 2 Price is incredible \$ 89.00 plus tax and fees.
- #3 Short drive or in some cases walk to restaurants etc.
- #4 several groups stay here for the fall and spring shows must be ok. We will meet a lot of other classic car owners here.

Other options are:

Microtel Inn – Group Rate for our stay dates is \$484.00 + taxes and fees for 3 nights.

Only offer 2 Queen beds / rooms not large enough for King beds. Open parking / 24 hour cancellation notice.

Days Inn: \$420.31 + taxes and fees. Continental breakfast. No Queen beds – Only Kings or doubles, they do not honor group rates.

Smoky Mountain Inn – Do not offer group rates – Price for 3 nights we want is \$509.57. I spoke with the manager and he wasn't very helpful and didn't seem to be concerned with our situation.

Cherokee Grand Hotel - their group rate is \$179.10 per night + taxes & fees, most expensive I've contacted.

TECH TIDBITS—The Ford Edsel

The Edsel was named after Henry Ford's son and it had its own division of the company devoted to its creation. In 1957 when the car debuted, the company had spent 10 years and \$250 million on planning one of its first brand-new cars in decades. The new intermediate line had begun in 1955 under the code name "E car", which stood for "experimental car." Ford Motor Company eventually decided on the name "Edsel", in honor of Edsel B. Ford, son of the company's founder. Edsel was described as a "reborn LaSalle," a General Motors brand that had disappeared in 1940.



The Edsel came in 18 models. For its inaugural model year, Edsel introduced a seven-model product line, including four sedans and three station wagons. The lower-trim Edsel Ranger and Edsel Pacer shared bodies with Ford Fairlane sedans. The Edsel Corsair and Edsel Citation shared bodies with the Mercury Monterey and Mercury Montclair sedans. Sharing its body



with Ford station wagons, Edsel offered the two-door Edsel Roundup and the four door Edsel Villager and Edsel Bermuda.

The Edsel model line offered multiple design features that were considered innovative for the time. In place of a horizontal strip or a round dial, the speedometer was a rotating dome; in line with aircraft design, the dashboard adopted warning lights for conditions as low oil level, parking brake engaged, and engine overheating. Edsel introduced

a speed warning on the speedometer if the driver exceeded a preset speed limit. Edsel also marked the introduction of the Teletouch push-button shifting system that was mounted in the steering wheel hub.

In the first year, 63,110 Edsels were sold in the United States, and 4,935 were sold in Canada. Though below expectations, this nevertheless represented the second-largest launch for any new car brand to date, exceeded only by the DeSoto introduction in 1929. The Edsel division was added to Lincoln-Mercury, with the re-christened Mercury-Edsel-Lincoln Division.

In response to the widely negative response to 1958 Edsel exteriors, the exterior of 1959 Edsels underwent a restyling to tone down its appearance. The 1959 Edsel interior dropped several features to increase its commonality with Ford. The push-button Teletouch transmission controls were withdrawn, alongside the rotating-dome speedometer, as Edsel introduced a slightly restyled version of the Ford Fairlane 500 dashboard.



In 1960, Edsel saw its model line reduced further, offering only the Ranger sedans, hardtop, and convertible alongside the Villager station wagon. Redesigned alongside 1960 Fords, 1960 Edsels were released with far more muted styling than their 1958 namesake. Ford announced the end of the Edsel program on November 19, 1959. 1960 Edsel Comet compact car was relabeled Mercury Comet and sold more cars in its first year than all models of Edsel ever produced. Fewer than 6,000 Edsels
