As many of you now know, our original reservations at Chestnut Tree Inn were cancelled without notice. The hotel was sold and the employees were given ONE DAY's notice. I have been on the phone and computer all morning checking out other options. Because the rates go up in the fall due to tourists booking rooms to enjoy the leaf changing season in the mountains, there are really no GREAT DEALS and not many good options. Great Smokies Inn has the best price and the ratings aren't bad. This hotel is only a quarter mile from the entrance to Cruising the Smokies event this year.



Travel on Thursday Oct 13. Check out & return home on Oct 16

I have already put a hold on 16 rooms here mostly because of convenience and price. If you choose to stay here, you must call 828-497-2020 – ask for Christy – and tell her you are with the Piedmont Classic Chevy Group. Christy explained that 3 Hotels have been recently bought out and phones have been ringing off the hook with travelers trying to find new accommodations. This is unfortunate but leaves us few choices.

### SPECIAL REQUEST !!!!

Don't forget to call and pay for your room. If you don't call by October 1<sup>st</sup>, your room will be dropped from the group and will be made available to someone else. Our group rate of \$89.00 is based on a minimum of 10 rooms. I have blocked 16. They all have 2 Queen beds

#### Downside:

- #1 They do not offer a breakfast option but are walking distance to several restaurants.
- #2 It is an older motel but appears to be nice.
- #3 some reviews aren't great but most are good.
- # 4 all available rooms are on second floor ( one short flight of stairs 4 other car groups have already booked all rooms on ground level and have been staying there twice per year for several years. That says a lot for return customers.

### Upside:

- #1 Convenient to everything especially the event.
- #2 Price is incredible \$89.00 plus tax and fees.
- #3 Short drive or in some cases walk to restaurants etc.
- # 4 several groups stay here for the fall and spring shows must be ok. We will meet a lot of other classic car owners here.

### Other options are:

Microtel Inn – Group Rate for our stay dates is \$484.00 + taxes and fees for 3 nights.

Only offer 2 Queen beds / rooms not large enough for King beds. Open parking / 24 hour cancellation notice.

Days Inn: \$420.31 + taxes and fees. Continental breakfast. No Queen beds – Only Kings or doubles, they do not honor group rates.

Smoky Mountain Inn – Do not offer group rates – Price for 3 nights we want is \$509.57. I spoke with the manager and he wasn't very helpful and didn't seem to be concerned with our situation.

Cherokee Grand Hotel - their group rate is \$179.10 per night + taxes & fees, most expensive I've contacted.

### Classic Car Trivia - The Cord (The "Baby Duesenberg," )



The Cord was the brand name of an American luxury automobile company from Connersville, Indiana, manufactured by the Auburn Automobile Company from 1929 to 1932 and again in 1936 and 1937.



The Cord Corporation was founded and run by E. L. Cord as a holding company for his many transportation interests, including the Auburn Automobile Company. Cord was noted for its innovative technology and streamlined designs. Other transportation entities included in the Cord Corporation were Stinson Aircraft, Checker Cab and American Airways which

later became American Airlines.

The Cord L-29—the first front-wheel-drive automobile sold in the American market. The price for the L-29 was \$3000, about \$42,000 in today's dollars. The L-29 cost more than its faster, more refined rivals, and the conservative buyers in this market were wary of new ideas like front drive. An \$800 price cut failed to spark interest, and the car disappeared in early 1932. A mere 4.429 had been built since mid-1929.

The Cord was powered by the 298.6-cubic-inch Lycoming straight eight was borrowed from the Auburn. Body styles comprised four-door sedan, brougham, and convertible, and a rumble-seat cabriolet.

The Cord Model 810/812 are probably the best-known, featuring front-wheel drive and independent front suspension. Having front drive enabled the model 810 to be built so low, to render running boards unnecessary.

The Cord 810/812's were powered by the Lycoming V8 of the same 125 horsepower as the L29's straight-8. The 810 had a four-speed electrically selected semi-automatic transmission, called a pre-selector because you selected the gear and then stepped on the clutch) among other innovative features like roll up headlights.

The car caused a sensation at the New York Auto Show in November 1935. Orders were taken at the show with Cord promising Christmas delivery, expecting production of 1,000 per month. Production delays pushed the expected delivery date to February 1936. This still proved optimistic – the first production vehicles were actually delivered in April. Cord managed to sell only 1,174 of the new 810 in its first model year. The car is well known for its flat front nose with a horizontal louvered grille design instead of the common radiator-style grille, that made its nose resemble a coffin, earning it the nickname of "Coffin Nose".

Early reliability problems, including slipping out of gear and vapor lock, cooled initial enthusiasm, and the dealer base shrank rapidly. Unsold left-over and in-process 1936 810's were renamed and sold as 1937 812's. In 1937, Auburn ceased production of the Cord.
