

David Smith's TECHNICAL TIDBITS

Well it has been a long HOT summer even for NC. This technical tip is not really a tech tip at all just a checklist for "Road Trip Essentials for the Trunk." I think all of us at one time or the other started out on a road trip or just a longer than normal cruise and realized that we were in the need of perhaps one or two of these items.

Extra coolant can be bought premixed and will come in real handy if you overheat even just a little. (It is a whole lot cheaper at the auto parts store as opposed to a service station in BFE).



A quart or two of oil. Also in the same category a quart of transmission oil would not hurt. (it can also be used for power steering).

A roll of duct tape. I know HUH? I have used duct tape to patch a lot of things on the road (driving trucks for 40 years I have seen it all). Hoses, radiators power steering lines and even an exhaust that broke 4 inches in front of the muffler, held it up for over 100 miles.



A bottle or scissors jack. Which one of us really trusts that factory jack that is sitting in your trunk. I did not trust them when they were new.



A small assortment of tools, a couple of screwdrivers a small wrench and socket sets a razor knife vise grips pliers and electrical tape.

And last but not least a **cell phone** to call for help when you really need it. Everything listed I have fit into a small plastic milk crate that fits in a small area of your trunk. Lining it with an old towel will insure to keep your trunk dry in case of a leak. These are just suggestions you can make a road trip goody box of whatever you want.



Keep The Shiny Side Up and the Greasy Side Down

Classic Car Trivia - Chevrolet Corvair

The Corvair was powered by an air-cooled horizontal six-cylinder engine made almost entirely out of aluminum. The engine was mounted in the rear of the car, driving the rear wheels through a compact automatic transaxle. Suspension was independent at all four wheels. There was no conventional frame; it was the first Unibody built by Fisher Body.

The 1960 Corvair was offered as a 2 door coupe & 4 door sedan in 2 trim levels. During the spring of 1960 a "sporty" Monza model was offered with full vinyl interior, bucket seats & full wheel covers.

For 1961 Chevrolet added a 4 door station wagon, a window van (the Greenbrier), a panel van (Corvair 95), and a pickup (the Rampside) that had a side panel (ramp) that hinged down to the road. All vehicles had the rear air cooled engines.






1962 saw major additions including: a convertible and the turbocharger option package. The option turbo included many changes - a few of those were: larger connecting rods, larger oil cooler, turbo & carb (horsepower increased from a max of 102hp to 150hp), chrome engine accents, special emblems, "Spyder" wheel cover inserts, special dash.

By 1963 the station wagon was gone. There were minor changes in trim and interior but for the most part the car was identical to the 1962.

1964 was to be the last year of the "early" style ("boxy style"). The Monza Spyder became an actual model instead of an option. Production decreased in 1964 as the Chevy II came out in 1962, the Chevelle in 1964 and the Ford Mustang





1965 was the first year of the "late style" - the "more modern style", that even today does not seem as "dated" as many cars from the mid '60s. There were numerous changes other than the obvious styling change.

1966 was the last year for the turbo and Corsa model-the Greenbrier was discontinued.

1967 - the Corsa was gone. This was the first year of the "skinny seats" and the last year for the 4 door. Chevy had "given up" on the Corvair, they now had their Camaro to fight the Mustang. There would be very little effort put into advertising.



In 1968, the four-door hardtop was discontinued, leaving three models – the 500 and Monza Hardtop Coupes and the Monza Convertible. Air conditioning was also dropped as an option.

The final 1969 model-year Corvairs were assembled with the Nova in Willow Run, Michigan, the same facility Corvairs had been built from the beginning.

Safety issues and especially handling problems dogged the reputation of the early Corvairs. A rigid steering column could impale drivers. Another problem was with the Corvair was its suspension, which made drivers oversteer and lose control of the vehicle. The hood hinges were so weak that it could detach during a car accident and become a dangerous projectile. The Corvair relied on an unusually high front to rear pressure differential (15psi front, 26psi rear, when cold; 18 psi and 30psi hot), and if one inflated the tires equally, as was standard practice for all other cars at the time, the result was a dangerous oversteer.
